Providing technical support for the group was Nicole's dad, Rowdy, who also is the president of the Esperance club. Rowdy's philosophy is that karting is a life-learning experience, which means karters must "put in" wherever possible.

This means packing and unpacking, cleaning the karts and all the other duties required of a race meeting.

It also means interpreting how the kart is performing and handling and making appropriate adjustments — even if the adjustment is wrong, something is still learnt.

The main adjustments Nicole made at Kalgoorlie were to tyre pressures and wheel position on the axles.

While Nicole loves karting, she still has time for softball, basketball and hockey and, of course, school.

With a racing membership of 45, the Esperance club is one of many Statewide sprint-kart clubs that have been steadily growing in recent years.

The club has a 655m track and an associated complex that would do justice to any kart club around Australia.

As with other successful clubs, all of this is the product of hard work by the members, their families and supporters.
